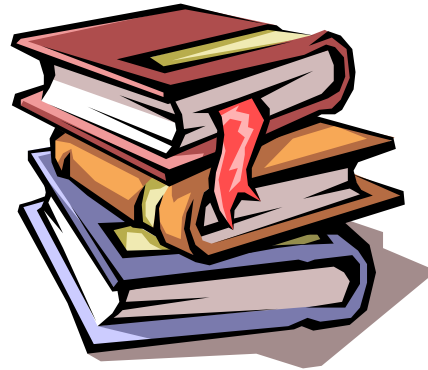

USING THIS GUIDE

While this list is comprehensive, it is by no means complete. We have done our best to provide accurate information in this manual, however, we recommend that you check out the various websites and contact the scholarship administrators for the most updated information. In addition to the various scholarships we have found, we have also provided a list of search engines. In order to help you find the best funding suited for you, we have categorized each resource by program; however, some may be cross listed with each other. Look over these resources carefully **paying particular attention to deadlines and eligibility requirements**. Most awards have deadlines well before the proposed award date so be sure to plan ahead. It is best to start researching at least a year before your intended program start date.

YOU MAY FIND MONEY IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD!

Before you begin your Internet search, one of the most immediate and accessible avenues of financial aid is to inquire directly at your home institution. For example, aside from the financial aid office, **students may also be able to get aid from deans or specific academic departments that relate to their study abroad focus by writing a proposal.**

In order to make your proposal more competitive, we suggest you include:

- Goals Statement (i.e. why this program is unique for you and what you will gain from both an academic and professional perspective).
- Cost breakdown of program (i.e. after meeting with your financial aid officer include financial aid transfer breakdown, breakdown of program itself, what costs you will cover and what you are proposing the department to cover. **BE REALISTIC!** Possible funding contributions can be towards airfare, books, or meals during homestays if applicable).
- Proof read! Proof read! Proof read! Have someone else read your proposal! **Please note that your proposal can be submitted to more than one funding source.**

SCHOLARSHIP AND GRANT APPLICATION GUIDELINES

Once you conduct an internet search or find scholarship and grant opportunities that you would like to pursue, it is time to begin the application process. The requirements and paper work necessary for some scholarships and grants, especially large and competitive awards, may seem intimidating. Remember that this process is to show your interest and commitment and is done by students your age each year. Most applications are composed of an Academic Proposal, Statement of Purpose and/or Personal Statement, Activities List or Resume, References, and sometimes Transcripts. While applications vary slightly, here are some suggestions and guidelines to help facilitate the process.

- Academic Proposal/Statement of Purpose is usually the bulk of the application. It spells out in detail what you want to do, why, where, how and when you want to do it. It is normally no longer than two pages and should include how well you are prepared for the program, how the program fits into you academic and future goals. This essay should be well written and thoroughly thought out. Make the appropriate re-writes and get others to proofread and make suggestions.
- Personal Statement is the opportunity to distinguish yourself from other applicants. It is not a restatement of honors, awards or activities, but an essay that shows your motivations, goals and ideas of how these will be realized. This essay should, also, be no more than two pages.
- Activities List, depending on the scholarship, this may be a separate document or information provided on the application form. Either way, this is the opportunity to demonstrate that you are a well-rounded individual with initiative, passions, talent and commitment. Some ways to extend this list include:
 - Essay contests
 - Research and Leadership opportunities
 - Volunteering
 - Service on University Committees
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Language study
- References are generally from academic faculty with whom you have had at least one course and whom you know well. They should reflect both your academic ability and potential.

FUNDING SOURCES

Scholarships Specifically for Study Abroad

Gilman International Scholarship (www.iie.org/gilman)

AEA students have successfully received funding for this scholarship in the past with awards up to \$5,000.

Program sponsored by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs in the U.S. Department of State.

Applicant must be eligible for Pell Grant and applying to a program that spends a minimum of four weeks in one country. Email: gilman@iie.org. **Application deadline for Fall: April 7, 2009.**

National Security Education Program (NSEP) (www.borenawards.org)

Federally funded scholarship awarded to undergraduate students who are interested in studying in an area of the world deemed critical for the US (non-Western European countries). Programs such as in Japan, India, Brazil, or Mali could apply. Must be studying a language during the program. Awards given on a merit-based system according to program costs. Application deadline for Fall: February 11, 2009.

Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships

Baden-Württemberg Scholarship

Students apply at the same time they apply to AEA; no extra forms are required. To be considered for this scholarship, you must meet an early application deadline of Feb. 15th, regardless of whether you are planning to go in the fall and/or spring semester(s).

Funding Applicable for Art and Culture in Mali Program

Elizabeth Greenshields Foundation Grant (<http://www.studyabroadfunding.org/international/Grant-171.html>)

Aids art students in obtaining further training or assistance. Awards are limited to candidates in the early stages of their careers working in the following: painting, drawing, printmaking, sculpture. To be eligible for a grant candidates must have already started or completed training at an established school. You could use this money for study abroad in Mali. Average Award: \$12,500 (Canadian). General Scholarships That Can Be Used for Study Abroad

Carpe Diem Foundation- (www.carpediemfoundation.org)

This scholarship awards merit based scholarships to qualified candidates. \$1500 per year for up to four years. Based on achievements, leadership, and community service. This award is not specifically for study abroad, but may be useful to cover tuition expenses.

Collegiate All-American Scholar Program- (www.usaa-academy.com)

This program offers cash grants to students. Application requires teacher recommendation, biography entry and then scholarships are chosen on basis of 1) grade point average 2) school activities and 3) honors and awards. Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund (www.davisputter.org)

Provides need-based funding up to \$6000 for student activists who are enrolled full-time in an undergraduate institution and who actively work for peace and justice. Citizenship is not a requirement, but students must be living in the US and enrolled in an accredited program in order to apply. Awards: 1st Place: \$1,000, 2nd Place: \$750, 3rd Place: \$250. **Deadline: June 16.**
